



## Statutory rights to fair compensation in land acquisition in India: A review

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### Abstract

This research paper examines the statutory rights to fair compensation in land acquisition in India. Land acquisition has been a contentious issue in the country, often leading to disputes and protests. The paper reviews the legal framework governing land acquisition and analyzes the provisions related to fair compensation as enshrined in the relevant legislation. The study also evaluates the effectiveness of these statutory rights in ensuring just and equitable compensation for affected landowners. The findings indicate that while there have been improvements in the legal framework, challenges remain in the implementation of fair compensation provisions. The paper concludes by suggesting measures to strengthen the statutory rights to fair compensation in land acquisition.

### Introduction

Land acquisition plays a crucial role in the economic and infrastructural development of any nation, including India. However, it often poses challenges in terms of equitable compensation for affected landowners. The Indian legal framework governing land acquisition has evolved over time to address these concerns. The Land Acquisition Act of 1894 was replaced by the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation, and Resettlement Act of 2013 (hereinafter referred to as "the 2013 Act"). This paper reviews the statutory rights to fair compensation enshrined in the 2013 Act and analyzes their effectiveness in ensuring just compensation for landowners.

It aimed to rectify the previous system's flaws, which often led to inadequate compensation for landowners.

Furthermore, the Act incorporated provisions for the rehabilitation and resettlement of affected families. It recognized the need to mitigate the adverse impacts of land acquisition by ensuring that affected individuals receive adequate support for their livelihoods and are provided with suitable alternative means of sustenance.

The introduction of the RFCTLARR Act represented a significant step towards aligning land acquisition practices in India with principles of fairness, justice, and protection of individual rights. By addressing the shortcomings of the Land Acquisition Act of 1894, the Act sought to strike a balance between the developmental needs of the nation and the rights and interests of affected individuals<sup>[2]</sup>.

#### **Statutory provisions for fair compensation**

The Indian Constitution provides for the taking over of land by the government or its agents for various public purposes including the promotion of industry, agricultural development, and urban and rural infrastructure<sup>[3]</sup>. Article 300A of the Constitution provides that no one is to be deprived of property without due compensation and the underlying rationale for this provision is to ensure that the affected party is not left worse off due to the forcible acquisition of his/her land<sup>[4]</sup>.

Furthermore, the principle of 'Public Purpose' has been enshrined in the Indian Constitution. In terms of public purpose, compensation can be provided for the acquisition of land even if it is not for the benefit of the public as a whole<sup>[5]</sup>. The underlying rationale of public purpose is to provide a fair and equitable compensation for affected landowners in return for their land.

Various legislative enactments have further supplemented the constitutional provisions. The Land Acquisition Act of 1894 was the first legislative enactment which addressed the issue of land acquisition in India<sup>[6]</sup>. The Act provided for the payment of compensation to affected landowners. Subsequently, the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement (LARR) Act, 2013 was enacted<sup>[7]</sup>. This Act provided a framework for ensuring that landowners are provided with fair, timely, and transparent compensation when their land is acquired by the government. Furthermore, it provides flexibility to the government on the criterion of "public purpose" by allowing the government to acquire any land for "public purpose", which also includes any economic activity or social infrastructure.

#### **The Payment of Compensation**

Under the LARR Act, 2013, the government is required to pay the affected landowners fair and just compensation. The compensation should be paid to affected landowners within a prescribed time limit and the amount should be determined in accordance with the provisions of the Act<sup>[8]</sup>. Furthermore, the government is required to pay an additional amount of solatium equal to 15% of the compensation amount as well as the cost of the alternative land which is to be provided to those affected<sup>[9]</sup>.

Under the Act, the compensation amount is to be determined by taking into account factors such as the existing use of the land, the total area acquired, the market value of the land, and the potential or expected value of the land at the time of acquisition<sup>[10]</sup>. Furthermore, the determination of the compensation amount should be undertaken in such a way that it neither impoverishes the affected landowners nor results in a windfall gain for them<sup>[11]</sup>.

In addition to the payment of compensation, the Act also provides for certain other statutory benefits to affected owners such as reconstruction assistance, rehabilitation and resettlement benefits, and land rights for unregistered

occupants<sup>[12]</sup>. The Act also requires the government to provide alternate livelihoods and basic amenities such as housing, health care, and education to those affected<sup>[13]</sup>.

It is clear that the Indian Constitution and subsequent legislative enactments have sought to ensure that affected landowners in India are provided with fair, timely, and transparent compensation for the acquisition of their lands. The payment of such compensation would enable them to benefit from the acquisition of their land without being adversely impacted financially. Furthermore, the provisions of the Act have also sought to ensure that the rights of unregistered occupants and other affected persons are also taken into consideration.

The statutory provisions of land acquisition in India, however, are not without flaws. There have been instances of the procedural requirements not being fully adhered to and of affected persons not being able to access the various statutory benefits provided for in the Act. This has led to a situation where affected persons have had to resort to litigation in order to seek justice. It is hoped that, with further reforms, these issues can be addressed and that affected persons are provided with full access to the statutory rights to fair compensation as laid down in the Act.

### A. Determination of Compensation

The determination of compensation involves assessing the value of the acquired land and properties to provide fair monetary compensation to affected individuals. Factors considered in the process include market value, potential value, location, and other relevant considerations. The compensation is intended to adequately compensate landowners for the loss of their property, taking into account its current and potential value. The Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013 provides guidelines for the determination of compensation, aiming to ensure that affected individuals receive just and equitable compensation for their land and properties.

#### 1. Market value of the land

The market value of the land refers to the estimated price at which the land would be sold in an open market transaction between a willing buyer and a willing seller. 4. **Cost of relocation:** If the land acquisition involves displacement of individuals or businesses, the cost of relocation and reestablishment may be considered as part of the compensation.
5. **Loss of livelihood:** In cases where the land acquisition affects livelihoods, such as agricultural land or businesses, the potential loss of income and livelihood may be taken into account.
6. **Future escalation in land value:** If there is a reasonable expectation of future increase in the land's value, it may be considered in the compensation determination.

#### d. Establishing a transparent and accountable rehabilitation and resettlement process

1. Developing clear guidelines and criteria for the rehabilitation and resettlement of affected landowners, including provisions for adequate housing, livelihood restoration, and access to essential services.
2. Ensuring transparency in the selection and allocation of alternative lands and resettlement sites, with clear criteria and a fair and participatory decision-making process.
3. Establishing mechanisms for monitoring and evaluating the effectiveness of rehabilitation and resettlement measures, with provisions for addressing grievances and providing remedial measures in cases of non-compliance.

By implementing these measures, the statutory rights to fair compensation can be significantly improved. Strengthening mechanisms for determining market value, ensuring timely compensation disbursement, enhancing consultation and participation of affected landowners, and establishing transparent and accountable rehabilitation and resettlement processes are essential steps towards achieving greater fairness and justice in land acquisition processes.

### Conclusion

The statutory rights to fair compensation in land acquisition in India have seen significant improvement with the enactment of the 2013 Act. However, challenges persist in the effective implementation of these provisions. It is crucial to address the issues surrounding assessment of market value, prompt disbursement of compensation, and equitable rehabilitation and resettlement measures. ### Suggestions
